

The **Alois** family, of Lombard origins, settled in Caserta as early as the 15th century. In 1863, they founded the eponymous textile company Alois, embarking on a successful history that led them to produce the elegant silks adorning some of the world's most famous palaces and residences: the Royal Palace of Caserta, the Vatican, the Taj Mahal, the White House, and the Louvre.

In 1992, **Michele Alois** left the silk business to join a pioneering group from Caserta in reviving ancient noble grape varieties that were planted by the **Bourbon** kings at the **Royal Palace of Caserta** at the end of the 18th century.

Massimo Alois joined his father to establish the family winery, Fattoria Alois, producing exceptional wines on volcanic soil, focusing on cultivating the native varieties Pallagrello Bianco, Pallagrello Nero, and Casavecchia, and complementing them with Falanghina and Aglianico, grape varieties found throughout the Campania region.

Located in the **Trebulani Mountains**, the winery benefits from vineyards characterized by excellent thermal excursion and ventilation, as well as a historic cellar with a barrel room that is part of the former Bourbon hunting estates.

After ten years of experimentation, the winery created three "cru" wines:

Morrone, Murella, and Trebulanum Riserva, and initiated a zoning project for

Alta Campania that will conclude in 2027 with the publication of an Atlas
encompassing historical, geological, and business aspects.

Alois wines have been praised by the most influential critics (**Decanter**, **Vinous**, **Wine Spectator**) and have repeatedly been awarded the prestigious **3 Bicchieri by Gambero Rosso**, the highest honor in Italy.
